Bridging the Gap in Classroom Management and Library Instruction (Academic)

In an era where libraries are evolving into dynamic learning environments, the role of library workers extends beyond traditional information services to include effective classroom management and instructional techniques. Many MLIS programs overlook practical teaching skills, such as classroom management, instructional design, and assessment techniques, leaving graduates unprepared for real-world educational settings. To address these gaps, programs should incorporate hands-on experiences, collaborative learning strategies, and ongoing professional development to better equip future librarians for their instructional roles. Through a combination of theoretical insights and practical strategies, this panel will explore methods for enhancing library instruction, fostering collaborative learning, and managing diverse user groups in various types of library settings. Participants will engage in discussions around integrating classroom management principles into library practices, leveraging instructional design frameworks, and developing interactive programming that meets the needs of various audiences. By equipping library workers with these essential skills, we can create more engaging, inclusive, and educational library experiences, ultimately strengthening the library's role as a vital community

Thinking Outside the Survey Box: Using Qualitative Tools to Gather Feedback from Unique Library User Groups (Academic)

Libraries often employ surveys to collect information about their users. However, studies have shown that surveys are less effective for targeting smaller populations. In contrast, qualitative approaches are well suited to capture the diversity of experience among small communities. The task of conducting and analyzing interviews can be daunting, as it not as straightforward as surveys. This presentation will review how qualitative research can be achieved using simple coding tools and adopting key project management practices. My aim is to demystify focus group methodology by drawing from a recent study I conducted on postdoctoral fellows on how they engage with the campus library. Specifically, this talk will outline data management practices for qualitative data and feature the free, open-source software, Taguette (https://www.taguette.org/) for coding transcripts. Taguette is easy to use, without the steep learning curve of other qualitative analysis tools like NVivo. While Taguette is limited in the types of analyses that it can perform and lacks the polish of commercial platforms, the product works well for projects with relatively simple data. By employing these tools and practices, attendees can confidently add qualitative research to their library's research toolkit.

Through a three-year project to revise the Jefferson County Public Library's circulation manual, members of the revision committee have encountered woefully out-of-date guidelines, circulation debates on topics we assumed everyone handled the same way, and the need to address questions that seemed to have no established answers. We're sharing the lessons we've learned along the way so that you can evaluate your own circulation policies and procedures - without spending three years doing it!

Fiction Reimagined: Rightsizing Academic Collections with AI and Collaborative Expertise (Academic)

This study, initiated by the Houston Cole Library's Instruction Committee at Jacksonville State University (JSU), aims to explore Jax State faculty attitudes toward AI use in the classroom and the importance of AI literacy among educators. The goal of the study is to equip library staff with a deeper understanding of faculty attitudes toward AI, allowing them to tailor literacy tools and resources more effectively. By identifying specific concerns and interests among faculty, library staff can develop targeted training programs that address AI literacy, focusing on how to integrate AI tools into teaching practices. The research gathered by the Houston Cole Librarians can be used in other libraries as a way to better understand how AI literacy and AI instruction can benefit the individual needs of faculty. This presentation will explore the heart of AI literacy and ethics and why librarians are an integral part of this conversation.

Word Clouds for Collection Development: Using Alma Analytics and Python to Identify Patron Preferences and Areas for Growth in Collections (Academic)

Assessing how patrons use our collections is crucial for making informed collecting decisions. It is equally important to assess what, or who, is over or underrepresented in our collections so that we offer access to as wide a variety of perspectives as possible, and patrons see themselves represented in our library.

This information can also help us identify areas of focus within the collection and anticipate needs based on discrepancies between the two datasets. I have developed a simple, yet effective, data visualization method to compare these two datasets for our leisure collection of over two hundred print books: by gathering data on our collection using Alma Analytics and cleaning it up using Python, I created a word cloud that illustrates subject terms highly present in our collection, and one that illustrates those terms which are most popular according to patron usage statistics. This visualization method can highlight target subjects in collection development and help us understand which areas have the highest potential for growth. As librarians, we seek both to respond to patron demand and introduce our users to new and diverse perspectives. I will outline how I use these tools to create word clouds and apply them to my collecting strategy for our leisure collection at a public, four-year degreegranting institution, and how they could be used for analyzing collections of academic disciplines and providing stakeholders with a birds-eye view of our institutional holdings.




Miracle Strip

Born in Birmingham, Alabama, Mr. Raines earned a bachelor's degree from Birmingham-Southern College and a master's degree in English from the University of Alabama.

He began his journalism career as a reporter for The Birmingham News before working at The Birmingham Post-Herald, The Tuscaloosa News, The Atlanta Journal, and The St. Petersburg Times. In 1978, he joined The New York Times as a national correspondent based in Atlanta.

Over the years, he held several key positions at the publication, including Atlanta Bureau Chief, White House Correspondent, London Bureau Chief, Editorial Page Editor, and ultimately, Executive Editor.
